

The EP is interested in how children learn, play, feel and behave. They like to hear what you have to say and how you think things could be better for you.

He or she may:

- ask you about yourself
- watch you in the classroom or playground
- ask you to show off your work
- do some puzzles or games with you
- talk to people who know you well

It is important to say what you think and ask any questions if you want to know things.

The EP may see you just once or a number of times. They will work with you, your teachers and your family to find ways to help you.







Information for Children



An Educational Psychologist or EP is someone who has been trained to understand how children learn and behave.



Who does an EP see?

An EP sees children of all ages to try to help them.

Grown-ups (adults) who know you well have asked the EP to help you feel happy and do well at school.
